In the quarter century since we started out, the agenda for Business in the Community has developed along with the political landscape. The Employers' Forum, launched in 2003 was the first in a range of employability initiatives that have enabled us to support over 3,000 people into employment to date.

I could quote many other achievements, but perhaps at this point, 25 years on, we should embrace the opportunity to take stock, be proud of what has been achieved to date and face the challenges that lie ahead with a clear strategy. It is my particular hope that B.I.T.C. can work together with my other charities for the overall benefit of everyone in Northern Ireland.

Looking to the future, I know the team in Northern Ireland has ambitious goals, but I am confident that our generous and enlightened members in Northern Ireland will pledge their support to help us achieve and, perhaps, even surpass them. To build a healthy society and a healthy economy, it is vital that enlightened business leaders see their relationship with society as a mutually beneficial partnership; one that puts in as much as it takes out; one that has its sights not just on profit, but on doing what B.I.T.C. stands for – releasing the untapped power of this country's social capital and nurturing a more balanced, more dynamic and much more durable economy in the future.

My gratitude goes to the Business in the Community teams across Northern Ireland and to the many members who have supported this journey since 1989. I can only wish you every success with your endeavours in the future.
